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India's pulses import may fall 15% in FY25

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With a good monsoon and improved sowing of pulses, it is estimated that India's pulse imports may decline by 5-15%, reaching 40-45 lakh tonnes this fiscal, down from 47.38 lakh tonnes last year, as stated by industry's lobby body India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) on Friday.

The area under cultivation in the 2024-25 kharif season has increased by 3% year-on-year, reaching 904.60 lakh hectares from 879.22 lakh hectares last year, according to agriculture ministry data released on 2

August. Pulses saw a massive rise in acreage, rising by 11% to 110.61 lakh hectares, representing 81.3% of the normal sown area, compared with 99.71 lakh hectares last year, according to the latest available data.

However, IPGA chairman Bimal Kothari urged the government to impose import duties on yellow peas and develop a long-term policy for the ₹2.5-trillion pulses market, as frequent policy changes negatively impacts stakeholders.

As it is estimated that there will be a significant increase in pulse production for the 2024-25 crop year and substantial imports in the previous fiscal, it would lead to a reduction in imports, he said.



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Imports of pulses may fall on good monsoon
 After climbing to the highest level in more than five years to 4.7 million tonnes in FY24, India might import fewer quantities of pulses this financial year at 4-4.5 mt on the back of good monsoon and higher domestic production, Bimal Kothari, chairman of India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA), said on Friday. 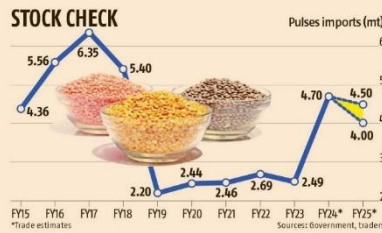
After climbing to the highest level in more than five years to 4.7 million tonnes in FY24, India might import fewer quantities of pulses this financial year at 4-4.5 mt on the back of good monsoon and higher domestic production, Bimal Kothari, chairman of India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA), said here on Friday.

Kothari was addressing reporters on the sidelines of a seminar on pulses titled "Bharat Dalhan-2024".

Though imports this year might decline as compared to FY24, experts said that unless the current policies are changed, overall import of pulses

might double to around 8-10 mt in the next five years. "Self-sufficiency in pulses production cannot be achieved through 'empty' slogans. We need to work towards that through concerted policy prescription," eminent agriculture economist and Distinguished Professor at the Indian Council for Research on International Economic Relations (Icrier) Ashok Gulati said.

Gulati, who was part of the seminar, said policies that are centred around fostering paddy production should be reversed and farmers in states like Punjab can be offered a subsidy of ₹39,000 per hectare for five years for making a switch from paddy to pulses. He said the subsidy should be supplemented by assured procure-



ment, so that farmers are encouraged to shift from water-guzzling and excessively produced paddy to more in-demand pulses.

Meanwhile, IPGA demanded that the government frame a long-term policy for the ₹2.5 lakh crore pulses market, as frequent changes in poli-

cies hurt the interest of all stakeholders. It also demanded the imposition of import duties on yellow peas.

Kothari said the country imported 1.6 mt of "masoor dal" in FY24. "We need only 1 mt imports of masoor dal," he stressed.

The IPGA chairman said imports of yellow peas may also fall from the 2023-24 level. "In FY24, India imported a record 2 mt of yellow peas ever since imports were allowed, while another 1.5 mt will come in the next 3-4 months," he said.

Kothari said the prices of pulses in wholesale markets have come down in the last month and are expected to ease further. "Tur prices have come down by ₹20/kg in wholesale markets in the past month. "Pulses prices will not increase this year, rather they will keep falling," Kothari said.

आईपीजीए के अध्यक्ष ने कहा कि थोक बाजारों में दालों की कीमतें पिछले महीने घटी हैं और इसमें आगे और कमी आने की आशंका है।

‘Pulses import may double to 10 mt by 2030 if Centre does not make policy intervention’

Only government intervention can help increase pulses production to meet the growing demand, which is expected to reach 40 million tonnes (mt) by 2030 as profitability of these crops is lower than competing crops, experts said.

Ashok Gulati, a former chairman of the Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP), said that if there is no change in the policy, pulses import may increase to 8-10 mt by 2030 the way demand has been growing.

He suggested a five-year crop diversification incentive by the Centre in States,

such as Punjab and Haryana, and said the yield of pulses is likely to be more in these States.

“Punjab has recently announced ₹7,000/acre incentive if farmers shift from paddy. It is time the Centre also contributes an equal amount as incentive if farmers grow pulses or oilseeds in Punjab and Haryana. Besides, there should be 100 per cent procurement,” Gulati said.

TO RAISE PROFITABILITY

He expressed the hope that if paddy farmers get around ₹35,000/hectare for crop diversification, there will not be any demand for legal guarantee of the minimum support price (MSP). This will also save the ground water

table, he said. The area under paddy in Punjab has gone from less than 5 per cent of gross cropped area in the early 1960s to over 40 per cent in 2021-22 while the area under pulses and oilseeds has declined from about 23 per cent to 1.5 per cent.

Pitching for pulses to be grown on more irrigated area, Vijay Paul Sharma, Chairman of Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP), said it may help raise profitability of these crops. “Today if you take any pulse crop, its profitability (net returns over costs) is much less compared to competitive crops and it is 50 per cent lower in some cases,” he said addressing a conclave on pulses, organ-

ised by India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) in New Delhi.

He cited the example of gram (chana) and lentil (masur) and said their profitability is half of what farmers get from wheat or mustard.

He suggested a remunerative and stable price has to be maintained to motivate farmers, in which the trade has a major role to play.

Addressing the media, IPGA Chairman Bimal Kothari said the demand for pulses is likely to reach 40 mt by 2030 with the increase in population.

He also said the import of pulses is likely to drop to 4-4.5 mt this fiscal from 4.74 mt in 2023-24 due to lower import of lentils and yellow peas.

Pulses import likely to decline on robust crop

THE COUNTRY'S IMPORT of pulses is likely to decline to 4 to 4.5 million tonne (MT) in the current fiscal from a record 4.73 MT in FY24 because of adequate monsoon rain and substantial imports last fiscal, Bimal Kothari, chairman, India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) said on Friday.

"We are expecting a higher kharif output because of good monsoon rains so far and in addition because of higher soil moisture, rabi or winter crops are likely to be robust," Kothari told FE at the sideline of 'Bharat Dalhan seminar 2024'.

He said that last year, pulses production was hit by El Nino impact, the production in the 2023-24 crop year (July-June) declined by 6% to 24.49 MT from 26.05 MT in 2022-23 crop year.

Kothari said that the prices of pulses in wholesale markets have come down in the last one month and are expected to ease further. Tur prices have come down by ₹20 per kg in wholesale markets in the past one month.



"Pulses prices will not increase this year, rather it will keep falling," he said.

Because of above-normal monsoon rainfall so far, area under kharif pulses such as tur, urad and moong rose sharply at 10.9% to 11.06 million hectare on year till August 3, which is expected to boost pulses production in the 2024-25 season.

To meet the rising demand, India's import of pulses rose by 90% on year to 4.73 MT during 2023-24 to meet domestic demand.

India imports about 15% of its

annual pulses consumption. Import of pulses stood at 2.46 MT in 2020-21, 2.69 MT in 2021-22 and 24.96 MT in 2022-23.

Wholesale prices of key pulses have declined by 8% in the last few weeks. According to the consumer affairs ministry, the modal retail prices of tur, whose prices rose highest at 26.86% in June on year, has declined to ₹160/kg on Friday, a decline of 8.5% on month.

"The declining trend in mandi prices is now reflected in retail prices in recent weeks as the all-India average retail prices of pulses have declined on a week-on-week basis," according to an official note.

This is expected to bring down inflation in pulses, which had been in double digit since June, 2023 in the next couple of months.

Meanwhile, Ashok Gulati, agricultural economist and former chairman, commission for agricultural costs and prices (CACPC) said with the increase in production not commensurate with demand, the country is likely to import 8-10 MT of pulses by 2030 if 'business as usual approach goes'.

किया था। हमें केवल 10 लाख टन मसूर दाल के आयात की जरूरत है। उन्होंने कहा कि पीली मटर का आयात भी 2023-24 के स्तर से कम हो सकता है। कोठारी ने कहा कि इस साल मानसून की बारिश बेहतर रही है। खरीफ सत्र में दालों का रकबा बढ़ा है। घरेलू उत्पादन बढ़ने की उम्मीद है। आईपीजीए के चेयरमैन ने कहा कि पिछले एक महीने में थोक बाजारों में दालों की कीमतों में कमी आई है और आगे भी इसमें कमी आने की उम्मीद है। पिछले एक महीने में थोक बाजारों में तुअर की कीमतों में 20 रुपये प्रति किलोग्राम की कमी आई है। कोठारी ने कहा कि इस साल दालों की कीमतें नहीं बढ़ेंगी, बल्कि गिरती रहेंगी। पिछले महीने, सरकार ने संसद को सूचित किया था कि घरेलू मांग को पूरा करने के लिए 2023-24 के दौरान भारत का दालों का आयात सालाना आधार पर 90 प्रतिशत बढ़कर 47.38 लाख टन हो गया।

There remains an opportunity to leverage the demand and supply together with better water scarcity, the extensive cultivation of rice is not sustainable. Shifting focus to pulses production could help India achieve self-reliance in this area. Farmers are receiving fair prices for Pulses, and the government has set Minimum Support Prices (MSP) to further support them."

He further added, "Our Hon'ble Prime Minister Narendra Modi ji has introduced various programs and initiatives to assist farmers. For example, before his tenure, during the UPA era under Manmohan Singh, the budget for farmers was ₹1,900 crore. Under Modi's administration, the budget increased to ₹25,000 crore in 2014 and now stands at ₹1,50,000 crore. Additionally, through the Kisan Samman Nidhi scheme, ₹3,24,000 crore has been directly transferred to nearly 11 crore farmers, with each receiving ₹2,000."

Mr. Dama Kothari, Chairman, India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) said, "Pulses production has steadily increased over the past decade. According to the Agriculture Ministry's 3rd Advance Estimate, pulses production in 2015-16 was 18.3 million tons. This has risen to 24.8 million tons in 2023-24. Over the last five years, the average production has been between 24 to 25 million tons, yet the demand anticipated to be around 30-32 million tons. 2024 has been an exceptional year for Pulses production, particularly due to favorable South-West monsoons in states like Maharashtra, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, and Gujarat. If moderate rains continue into August and September, we are optimistic about surpassing last year's production, which was impacted by heavy rainfall. We need long term vision and policy measures to sustain the availability of pulses to fulfill the demand and keep food inflation in control."

Mr. Vijay Iyengar, President, Global Pulse Confederation said, "India, as the world's largest producer, consumer, and importer of Pulses enjoys a significant position in advancing and expanding the global Pulses trade and industry. We appreciate IPGA's role in providing knowledge, disseminating information, encouraging dialogue and promoting transparency amongst the key stakeholders of the global pulses sector through such critical platforms."

Shri. Vijay Paul Sharma, Chairman, CAPC, GOI said, "Since lentil production is highly concentrated in specific districts, any adverse weather can significantly impact the entire output. To mitigate this risk, it's crucial that we invest efforts across all states and regions to enhance productivity. We must prioritize areas where pulse production remains resilient against weather and other external factors. Pulses also offer a much higher rate of profitability for farmers compared to other crops, making it essential to focus on improving productivity and reducing cultivation costs. As pulses become more profitable with fewer inputs, farmers will naturally gravitate towards them, but we currently lack sufficient support in this area. There are three critical areas where we must concentrate our efforts. First, we need to intensify research and development to create crop varieties that are more sustainable in the face of climate change. Second, the shelf life of crops today is shorter than in the past, so we must work on enhancing the quality and sustainability of pulses and other crops to extend their shelf life. Lastly, it is vital to ensure that farmers receive competitive prices and returns for these crops, supported by stable policies to sustain the growth."

Dr. Ashok Gulati, Distinguished Professor, ICAR, Former Chairman CAPC, GOI said, "To be self-sufficient in the pulses sector, we need change. Government must encourage varieties for the pulses farmers to achieve self-sufficiency in pulses. Incentives such as ₹5,000 per hectare to those farmers who are willing to switch from paddy production to pulses, oilseeds or even millets should be announced. Such measures will help save the state government on power subsidy and central government on fertilizer subsidy hence both governments must be aligned in the best interest of farmers and the agriculture sector."

Over the past seven years, the Indian Pulses sector has experienced numerous short-term policy changes and reactive decisions that have negatively impacted farmers, traders, and other stakeholders in the value chain. The seminar highlighted the critical need for a liberal and long-term policy framework to overcome these bottlenecks and ensure a stable supply of Pulses to meet the rising demand. 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India's import of pulses may fall to 40-45 lakh tons in FY25, from 47.38 lakh tons in FY24: Industry

 India's pulse imports were projected to drop to 40-45 lakh tonnes from 47.38 lakh tonnes last year due to good monsoons driving up domestic production, IPGA called for a long-term policy for the pulses market and import duties on yellow peas. Retail prices were expected to fall with increased domestic supply.

India's import of pulses may decline to 40-45 lakh tonnes this fiscal from 47.38 lakh tonnes in the previous year, as a good monsoon is likely to result in higher domestic production and lower retail prices, industry body IPGA Chairman Bimal Kothari said on Friday.

India Pulses & Grains Association (IPGA) also demanded that the government should frame a long-term policy for the Rs 2.5 lakh crore **pulses** market, as frequent changes in policies hurt the interest of all stakeholders. It also demanded imposition of import duties on yellow peas.

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Kothari said the country imported 16 lakh tonnes of masoor dal last fiscal. "We need only 10 lakh tonnes imports of masoor dal".



He said imports of yellow peas may also fall from 2023-24 level.

"This year monsoon rains have been better. Pulses acreage has gone up in Kharif season. The domestic production is expected to rise," Kothari said.

The IPGA Chairman said the prices of pulses in wholesale markets have come down in the last one month and are expected to ease further. Tur prices have come down by Rs 20 per kg in wholesale markets in the past one month.


"Pulses prices will not increase this year, rather it will keep falling," Kothari said.

New Delhi: With a good monsoon and improved sowing of pulses, India's imports of these daily staples may decline by 5-15% in 2024-25, an industry body estimated, after domestic production drove up imports, and prices, in the first two months of this financial year.

India's imports of pulses are expected to drop to 4-4.5 million tonnes this fiscal year from 4.74 million tonnes in 2023-24, the India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) said on Friday.

The area under pulses cultivation in the 2024-25 kharif (monsoon crops) season has increased by 3% year-on-year, reaching 90.46 million hectares from 87.9 million hectares in the corresponding season last year, according to agriculture ministry data released on 2 August.

Pulses have seen a significant increase in acreage, rising by 11% to 11.06 million hectares, representing 81.3% of the normal sown area, compared to 9.97 million hectares last year, according to the latest available data.

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IPGA chairman Bimal Kothari urged the government to impose import duties on yellow peas and develop a long-term policy for India's ₹2.5-trillion pulses market, as frequent changes in policies hurt the interests of stakeholders.

In April and May, India's imports of pulses jumped about 20% to 371,334 tonnes from 308,819 tonnes in the same two months last year as lower domestic production caused a surge in demand for tur (pigeon pea), and urad (black matpe), [Mint reported](#).

Presenting the Union Budget for 2024-25 last month, India's finance minister Nirmala Sitharaman reiterated the government's intention of making India self-sufficient in pulses, and ending their imports by December 2027.

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पांच वर्ष से अधिक समय में दालों का आयात वित्त वर्ष 2024 में सबसे उच्च स्तर 47 लाख टन पर पहुंचने के बाद, भारत इस वित्त वर्ष में दालों का आयात कम कर सकता है। इंडिया पल्सेस एंड ग्रैस एसोसिएशन (आईपीजीए) के विमल कोठारी ने शुक्रवार को कहा कि बेहतर मौसून और घरेलू उत्पादन में तेजी के चलते मौजूदा वित्त वर्ष में दालों का आयात 40-45 लाख टन रह सकता है। उन्होंने 'भारत दलहन-2024' शीर्षक वाले दालों से जुड़े सेमिनार में हिस्सा लेने के बाद संवाददाताओं से भी बात की।

हालांकि वित्त वर्ष 2024 की तुलना में इस साल आयात घट सकता है लेकिन विशेषज्ञों का कहना है कि जब तक मौजूदा नीतियों में बदलाव नहीं होता है तब तक दालों का कुल आयात अगले पांच वर्षों में यानी 2023 तक दोगुना होकर 80 लाख से 1 करोड़ टन तक हो सकता है।

प्रतिष्ठित कृषि अर्थशास्त्री और इंडियन काउंसिल फॉर रिसर्च ऑन इंटरनेशनल इकॉनॉमिक रिलेशंस (इक्रियर) के विशिष्ट प्रोफेसर अशोक गुलाटी ने कहा, 'खाली नारों से दाल उत्पादन में आत्मनिर्भरता नहीं हासिल की जा सकती है। हमें इसके लिए ठोस नीतिगत उपायों पर काम करने की जरूरत है।'

इसी सेमिनार में शिरकत करने वाले गुलाटी ने कहा कि धान के उत्पादन को बढ़ावा देने वाली नीतियों को बदला जाना चाहिए और पंजाब जैसे राज्यों में किसानों को पांच वर्षों तक धान की जगह दलहन की खेती करने के लिए 39,000 रुपये प्रति हेक्टेयर तक की सब्सिडी की पेशकश की जा सकती है।

उन्होंने कहा कि सब्सिडी के पूरक के तौर पर निश्चित खरीद की भी आवश्यकता है ताकि किसानों को पानी की अधिक खपत वाले और अधिक पैदावार वाले धान की जगह ज्यादा मांग वाले दलहन की खेती के लिए प्रोत्साहित किया जा सके।

आईपीजीए ने मांग की है कि सरकार को 2.5 लाख करोड़ रुपये के दाल बाजार के लिए एक दीर्घावधि नीति बनानी चाहिए क्योंकि नीतियों में बार-बार बदलाव से सभी हितधारकों के हितों पर नकारात्मक असर पड़ता है। इस संस्था ने पीली मटर पर भी आयात शुल्क लगाने की मांग की।

विमल कोठारी ने कहा कि देश ने पिछले वित्त वर्ष में 16 लाख टन मसूर दाल का आयात किया। उन्होंने कहा, 'हमें केवल 10 लाख टन मसूर दाल आयात की दरकार है।' उन्होंने कहा कि पीली मटर का आयात 2023-24 के स्तर से घट सकता है।

जब से आयात की अनुमति मिली उसके बाद वित्त वर्ष 2024 में भारत ने रिकॉर्ड स्तर पर 20 लाख टन पीली मटर का आयात किया जबकि अगले 3-4 महीने में 10-15 लाख टन और आयात होगा। आईपीजीए के अध्यक्ष ने कहा कि धोक बाजारों में दालों की कीमतें पिछले महीने घटी हैं और इसमें आगे और कमी आने की आशंका है।

The country's import of pulses is likely to decline to 4 to 4.5 million tonne (MT) in the current fiscal from a record 4.73 MT in the FY24 because of adequate monsoon rain and substantial imports last fiscal, Bimal Kothari, chairman, India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) on Friday said.

"We are expecting a higher kharif output because of good monsoon rains so far and in addition because of higher soil moisture, rabi or winter crops are likely to be robust," Kothari told FE at the sideline of 'Bharat Dalhan seminar 2024'.

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NEW DELHI: The import of pulses is likely to decline marginally to 40-45 lakh tonne compared to last year's 47 lakh tonne due to good monsoon resulting in rise in production and last year's higher import of pulses, India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) said on Friday while demanding the govt have a long term and stable policy on import of the key kitchen item.


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Experts said that unless the current policies are changed, the overall import of pulses might double to around 80-100 lakh tonne by 2030 considering the increasing consumption.

Speaking to reporters on the sidelines of a seminar on pulses titled "Bharat Dalhan-2024", IPGA chairman Bimal Kothari said they expect the govt to frame a long-term policy for the Rs 2.5 lakh crore pulses market, as frequent changes in policies hurt the interest of all stakeholders.

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He added that India imported 16 lakh tonne of masoor dal last fiscal. "We need only 10 lakh tonne imports of masoor dal. Imports of yellow peas may also fall from 2023-24 level," he said. Kothari added that prices of pulses in wholesale markets have fallen in the last month and are expected to ease further. Tur prices have come down by Rs 20 per kg in wholesale markets in the past month. "Pulses prices will not increase this year, rather they will keep falling," he said.

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Agriculture economist Ashok Gulati said that self-sufficiency in pulses production cannot be achieved through 'empty' slogans. "We need to work towards that through concerted policy prescription. If we don't make changes in policy and continue business as usual, our import will touch 80-100 lakh tonne by 2030," he said.

Gulati added that policies which are centred around encouraging paddy production should be reversed and farmers in states like Punjab can be offered a subsidy of Rs 39,000 per hectare for five years for taking up pulses cultivation instead of paddy.

After reaching a five-year high of 4.7 million tonnes in FY24, India is expected to import fewer pulses this financial year, with estimates between 4 and 4.5 million tonnes. This decrease is attributed to a favourable monsoon and increased domestic production, as Bimal Kothari, chairman of the India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA), stated on Friday.

Kothari shared this information during a seminar on pulses titled "Bharat Dalhan-2024," reported Business Standard.

While imports may decrease compared to FY24, experts warn that if current policies remain unchanged, overall pulse imports could double to approximately 8-10 million tonnes over the next five years. Ashok Gulati, an eminent agriculture economist and Distinguished Professor at the Indian Council for Research on International Economic Relations (ICRIER), emphasised that achieving self-sufficiency in pulse production requires more than just a bumper monsoon.

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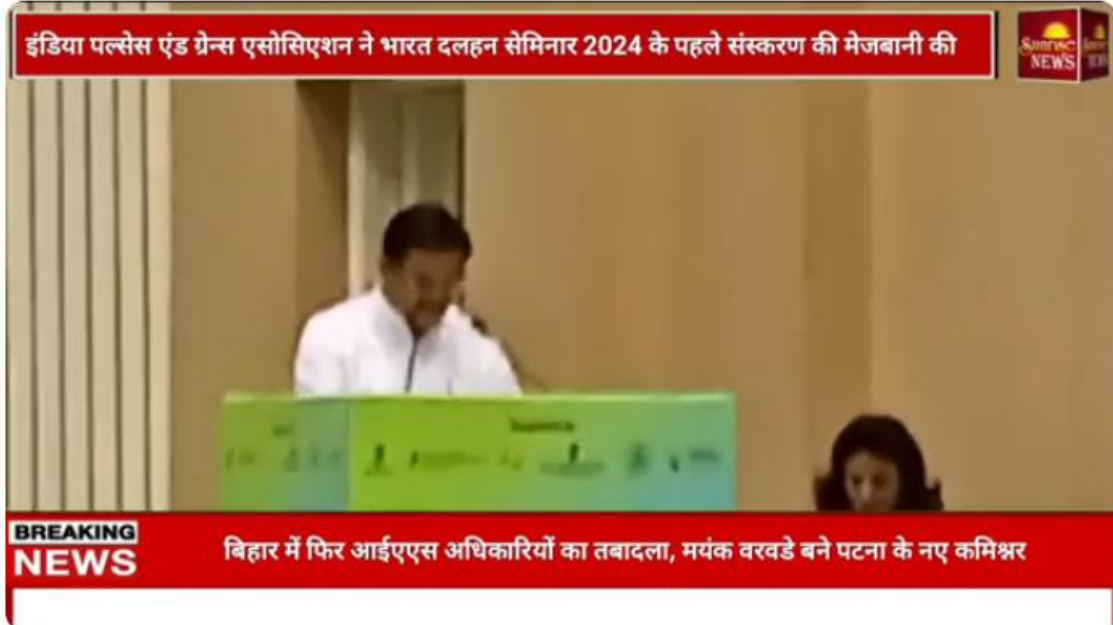

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India's Pulses Import Likely To Fall To 4.5 MT In FY25: IPGA Chairman

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The expected fall in the imports of pulses in the current year is on the back of better domestic production in the 2024-25 crop year



Aided by the forecast of a good monsoon season by the Indian Meteorological Department (IMD) and higher domestic production, India's reliance on the import of pulses is expected to fall in this financial year, according to India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) chairman Bimal Kothari. The country is likely to import 4 to 4.5 million tonne (MT) of pulses in this fiscal as compared with the import of 4.73 MT in the last financial year, the chairman stated.

Citing the frequent policy changes, the IPGA demanded the Centre to introduce a long-term policy for the pulses market, along with the demand to impose import duties on yellow peas.

Kothari, while speaking at the Bharat Dalhan Seminar 2024, stated that the expected fall in the imports of pulses in the current year is on the back of better production in the 2024-25 crop year. He also attributed the higher imports of pulses in the previous fiscal to the fall in the current fiscal, as per media reports.

"The country imported 16 lakh tonne of masoor dal last year. We need only ten lakh tonne imports of masoor dal." The chairman stated that the yellow peas import is set to decline from the 2023-24 level.

Stating that the prices of pulses will not increase in the current fiscal, the chairman said that the prices of pulses have shown a downward trend in the last month in the wholesale market and are expected to do so in the coming months. Tur prices have registered a drop by Rs 20 per kg in the last one month in the wholesale markets, he stated.

The Centre provided the data on the import of pulses in the parliament last month. The data revealed that such imports rose by 90 per cent annually to take the figures at 47.38 lakh tonne during 2023-24. The import of pulses in 2020-21 was 24.66 lakh tonne, while the number went up in 2021-22 to 26.99 lakh tonne. However, the imports came down to 24.96 lakh tonne in 2022-23, according to the data by the Centre.

During the April-May period of FY25, the country has imported around 11.32 lakh tonne of pulses.

Pulses production in India has seen significant growth, rising from 16.32 million tonnes in 2015-16 to nearly 25 million tonnes in 2023-24, according to the latest estimates

India's pulse imports, which reached a five-year high of 4.7 million tonnes in FY24, are expected to decline to 4-4.5 million tonnes in FY25, driven by a good monsoon and increased domestic production. This projection was made by Bimal Kothari, Chairman of the India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA), during a seminar titled "Bharat Dalhan-2024" in New Delhi on Friday.

While imports are anticipated to decrease this year, experts caution that without policy changes, India's overall pulse imports could double to 8-10 million tonnes over the next five years. Eminent agriculture economist Ashok Gulati, a Distinguished Professor at the Indian Council for Research on International Economic Relations (Icrier), highlighted the need for targeted policy interventions to prevent this surge.

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Gulati advocated for a reversal of policies that favour paddy production. He suggested offering a subsidy of Rs 39,000 per hectare for five years to farmers in states like Punjab to encourage a switch from water-intensive paddy to pulses. This subsidy, he proposed, should be coupled with assured procurement to incentivize farmers to shift to pulse cultivation.

The IPGA also called for the government to establish a long-term policy for the Rs 2.5 lakh crore pulses market, noting that frequent policy changes negatively impact stakeholders. Additionally, the association urged the imposition of import duties on yellow peas to protect domestic producers.

Kothari noted that in FY24, India imported 1.6 million tonnes of masoor dal, despite needing only 1 million tonnes. He also predicted a decline in yellow pea imports from last year's record level. "In FY24, India imported a record 2 million tonnes of yellow peas since imports were allowed, with another 1-1.5 million tonnes expected in the next 3-4 months," Kothari said.

He added that pulse prices in wholesale markets have decreased over the past month, with further reductions expected. For example, tur prices have dropped by Rs 20 per kilogram in the last month. "Pulses prices will not increase this year; rather, they will continue to fall," Kothari emphasised.

Verma, Hon'ble Minister of State for the Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution, GOI; Mrs. Nimuben Jayantibhai Bambhaniya, Minister of Parliament Bhavnagar Lok Sabha, Minister of State, Minister of Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution; Shri. Mitesh Patel, Member of Parliament, Anand, Lok Sabha, Gujarat; Dr. Ashok Gulati, Distinguished Professor, ICRIER, Former Chairman CACP, GOI; Shri. Vijay Paul Sharma, Chairman, CACP, GOI; Mr. Vijay Iyengar, President, Global Pulse Confederation, Mr. Bimal Kothari, Chairman, IPGA, and Mr. Manek Gupta - Vice Chairman IPGA. Shri. B. L. Verma, Hon'ble Minister of State for Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food And Public Distribution, GOI said, "Over the past five years, grain production has increased from 21.1 million tons to 22.7 million tons, while consumption has grown from 22.7 million tons to 24.6 million tons. There remains an opportunity to balance this demand and supply. However, with looming water scarcity, the extensive cultivation of rice is not sustainable. Shifting focus to Pulses production could help India achieve self-reliance in this area. Farmers are receiving fair prices for Pulses, and the government has set Minimum Support Prices (MSPs) to further support them."

He further added, "Our Hon'ble Prime Minister Narendra Modi ji has introduced various programs and initiatives to assist farmers. For example, before his tenure, during the UPA era under Manmohan Singh, the budget for farmers was ₹21,900 crore. Under Modi's administration, this budget increased to ₹25,000 crore in 2014 and now stands at ₹1,52,000 crore. Additionally, through the Kisan Samman Nidhi scheme, ₹3,24,000 crore has been directly transferred to nearly 11 crore farmers, with each receiving ₹2,000."

Mr. Bimal Kothari, Chairman, India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA) said, "Pulses production has steadily increased over the past decade. According to the Agriculture Ministry's 3rd Advance Estimate, pulses production in 2015-16 was 16.3 million tons. This has risen to 24.5 million tons in 2023-24. Over the last five years, the average production has been between 24 to 25 million tons, yet the demand is anticipated to be around 30-32 million tons. 2024 has been an exceptional year for Pulses production, particularly due to favorable South-West monsoons in states like Maharashtra, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, and Gujarat. If moderate rains continue into August and September, we are optimistic about surpassing last year's production, which was impacted by heavy rainfall. We need long term vision and policy measures to sustain the availability of pulses to fulfil the demand and keep food inflation in control."

Mr. Vijay Iyengar, President, Global Pulses Confederation said, "India, as the world's largest producer, consumer, and importer of Pulses enjoys a significant position in advancing and expanding the global Pulses trade and industry. We appreciate IPGA's role in providing knowledge, disseminating information, encouraging dialogue and promoting transparency amongst the key stakeholders of the global pulses sector through such critical platforms."

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India's import of pulses is anticipated to drop to 40-45 lakh tonnes this fiscal year, down from 47.38 lakh tonnes in the prior year, due to favorable monsoon conditions likely boosting domestic yields and decreasing retail prices, stated IPGA Chairman Bimal Kothari on Friday.

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The India Pulses & Grains Association (IPGA) has also urged the government to establish a long-term policy for the Rs 2.5 lakh crore pulses market, citing that inconsistent policies adversely impact all stakeholders. Additionally, the association is advocating for the imposition of import duties on yellow peas.



'Pulses imports are estimated to be 40-45 lakh tonnes this fiscal,' Kothari announced at the 'Bharat Dalhan Seminar 2024' in the national capital. He attributed the expected decline in imports to improved domestic production and higher imports in the previous fiscal year.

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New Delhi, Aug 9 (PTI) India's import of pulses may decline to 40-45 lakh tonnes this fiscal from 47.38 lakh tonnes in the previous year, as a good monsoon is likely to result in higher domestic production and lower retail prices, industry body IPGA Chairman Bimal Kothari said on Friday.

India Pulses & Grains Association (IPGA) also demanded that the government should frame a long-term policy for the Rs 2.5 lakh crore pulses market, as frequent changes in policies hurt the interest of all stakeholders. It also demanded imposition of import duties on yellow peas.

"Pulses imports are likely to be 40-45 lakh tonnes this fiscal," Kothari told reporters at 'Bharat Dalhan Seminar 2024' being held here in the national capital.

He said the imports would fall because of expectation of better production of pulses in 2024-25 crop year and also higher imports in the previous fiscal.

Kothari said the country imported 16 lakh tonnes of masoor dal last fiscal. "We need only 10 lakh tonnes imports of masoor dal".

He said imports of yellow peas may also fall from 2023-24 level.

"This year monsoon rains have been better. Pulses acreage has gone up in Kharif season. The domestic production is expected to rise," Kothari said.

The IPGA Chairman said the prices of pulses in wholesale markets have come down in the last one month and are expected to ease further. Tur prices have come down by Rs 20 per kg in wholesale markets in the past one month.

"Pulses prices will not increase this year, rather it will keep falling," Kothari said.

Last month, the government informed Parliament that India's import of pulses rose 90 per cent annually to 47.38 lakh tonnes during 2023-24 to meet domestic demand.

Import of pulses stood at 24.66 lakh tonnes in 2020-21; 26.99 lakh tonnes in 2021-22 and 24.96 lakh tonnes in 2022-23.

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Imports of pulses may dip in FY25 on good monsoon

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After climbing to the highest level in more than five years to 4.7 million tonnes in FY24, India might import fewer quantities of pulses this financial year at 4-4.5 mt on the back of good monsoon and higher domestic production, Bimal Kothari, chairman of India Pulses and Grains Association (IPGA), said in New Delhi on Friday.

Though imports this year might decline as compared to FY24, experts said that unless the current policies are changed, overall import of pulses might double to around 8-10 mt in the next five years.

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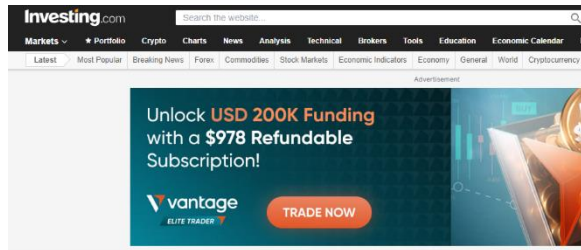

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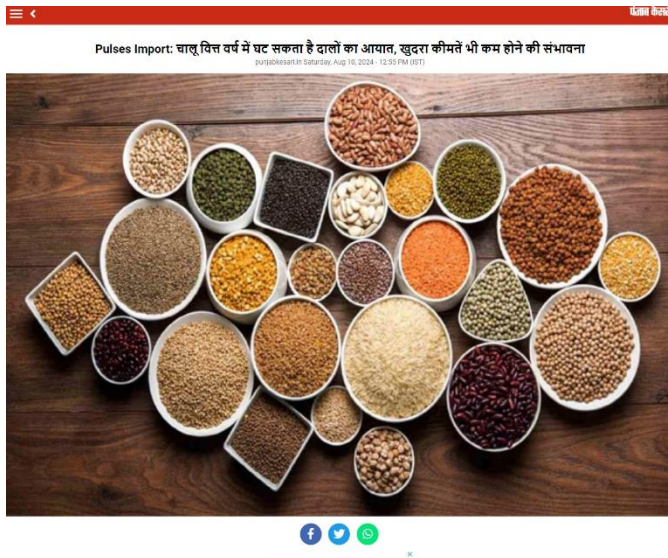

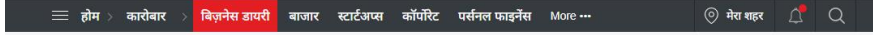

आयात में कमी आएगी

कोठारी ने राष्ट्रीय राजधानी में आयोजित 'भारत दलहन सेमिनार 2024' में संवाददाताओं से कहा, "इस वित्त वर्ष में दालों का आयात 40-45 लाख टन रहने की संभावना है।" उन्होंने कहा कि फसल वर्ष 2024-25 में दालों के बेहतर उत्पादन की उम्मीद और पिछले वित्त वर्ष में अधिक आयात के कारण आयात में कमी आएगी।

पीली मटर का आयात भी हो सकता है कम

दाल की कीमत होगी कम

कोठारी ने कहा, "इस साल दालों की कीमतें नहीं बढ़ेंगी, बल्कि गिरती रहेंगी।" पिछले महीने, सरकार ने संसद को सूचित किया था कि घरेलू मांग को पूरा करने के लिए 2023-24 के दौरान भारत का दालों का आयात सालाना आधार पर 90 प्रतिशत बढ़कर 47.38 लाख टन हो गया।

भारत अपनी वार्षिक दालों की खपत का लगभग 15 फीसदी आयात करता है. साल 2020-21 में दालों का आयात 2.46 मिलियन टन, 2021-22 में 2.69 मिलियन टन और 2022-23 में 24.96 मिलियन टन रहा है. एक अधिकारी ने कहा कि पिछले कुछ हफ्तों में प्रमुख दालों की थोक कीमतों में 8 फीसदी की गिरावट आई है. उपभोक्ता मामलों के मंत्रालय के अनुसार, अरहर की मॉडल खुदरा कीमतें, जिनकी कीमतें जून में सालाना आधार पर सबसे अधिक 26.86 प्रतिशत बढ़ी थीं, शुक्रवार को घटकर 160 रुपये प्रति किलोग्राम हो गईं, जो महीने दर महीने 8.5 फीसदी की गिरावट है. एक आधिकारिक नोट के अनुसार, मंडी की कीमतों में गिरावट का रुझान अब हाल के हफ्तों में खुदरा कीमतों में दिखाई दे रहा है, क्योंकि दालों की अखिल भारतीय औसत खुदरा कीमतों में सप्ताह-दर-सप्ताह आधार पर गिरावट आई है. इससे दालों की महंगाई दर में कमी आने की उम्मीद है, जो जून 2023 से दोहरे अंकों में है.

क्या कहते हैं कृषि अर्थशास्त्री

इस बीच, कृषि अर्थशास्त्री और कृषि लागत एवं मूल्य आयोग (सीएसपी) के पूर्व अध्यक्ष अशोक गुलाटी ने कहा कि उत्पादन में वृद्धि मांग के अनुरूप नहीं होने के कारण, यदि सामान्य रूप से व्यापार करने का तरीका अपनाया जाता है तो देश को 2030 तक 8-10 मिलियन टन दालों का आयात करना पड़ सकता है. दालों के उत्पादन को बढ़ावा देने के लिए, गुलाटी ने सुझाव दिया है कि पंजाब और हरियाणा के किसानों को धान से दालों की खेती करने के लिए 35,000 रुपये प्रति हेक्टेयर का वित्तीय प्रोत्साहन दिया जाना चाहिए और सरकार को न्यूनतम समर्थन मूल्य (एमएसपी) पर दालों की खरीद सनिश्चित करनी चाहिए.

कोठारी ने राष्ट्रीय राजधानी में आयोजित 'भारत दलहन सेमिनार 2024' में संबोधित करते हुए कहा, "इस वित्त वर्ष में दालों का आयात 40-45 लाख टन रहने की संभावना है।"

उन्होंने कहा कि फसल वर्ष 2024-25 में दालों के बेहतर उत्पादन की उम्मीद और पिछले वित्त वर्ष में अधिक आयात के कारण आयात में कमी आएगी।
